

A decade of making a difference

Since 2012, 26TEN has led our nation as a ground-breaking, comprehensive and long-term response that engages the whole state in raising adult literacy and numeracy skills.

Here, we take the opportunity to highlight milestones and successes and to celebrate 26TEN and a decade of making a difference.

Over the decade 26TEN's success has been in its collective action approach that unites businesses, community groups, educators, government and individuals in a network that is building skills around Tasmania.

Members of the 26TEN Network have increased as more people and organisations understand that better literacy and numeracy opens opportunities for people. In families, parents can engage with their children's education. Better skills mean businesses are safer and more productive. Communities are more resilient and have higher levels of prosperity. Our state benefits from the skills and talents of all our people.

Those Tasmanians who want to improve their reading, writing and maths skills have different needs and aspirations. Whether the learner's goal is to get a job or promotion at work, get a driver licence or read the notes their child's teacher sends home from school, members of the 26TEN Network are helping.

Members such as Huon Aquaculture, Australia Foods (Fonterra Australia) or Glenhaven Family Care make help available in the workplace. More formal support is available at TasTAFE. Help can be found at the library in Glenorchy, the Child and Family Learning Centre in Clarence Plains, the neighbourhood house in Ravenswood and the community centre in Geeveston. These are just a few examples of where 26TEN is in action.

However, there are still barriers to learning. They might be getting time off work, finding transport, getting childcare, ill health or simply meeting the pressing needs of everyday life. While 26TEN has had some success in reducing stigma, it continues to be a significant barrier. Too many people are ashamed of their lack of skills and reluctant to seek help.

That's why we must remember that there are many reasons people have low literacy and we need to be flexible in how help is provided and give each and every Tasmanian ways to contribute.

The 26TEN collective action approach is working and there are still many more people to help. We must continue to give Tasmanians the support they need for work, and in their families and communities. Better literacy and numeracy means a better Tasmania for all.

What we do

26TEN unites business, community and government in a statewide effort to raise adult literacy and numeracy levels. Our name comes from the 26 letters of the alphabet, and the ten digits we use for counting.

Since 2012, 26TEN has been Australia's only statewide, comprehensive and long-term response to lifting adult literacy and numeracy. It also has tri-partisan political support.

The 26TEN vision is for all Tasmanians to have the literacy and numeracy skills they need to participate fully in work and life.

Our goals

- I. Everyone knows about adult literacy and numeracy.
- 2. Everyone is supported to improve their skills and to help others.
- 3. Everyone communicates clearly.


